

hoping your holidays; Thanksgiving, Christmas, Hanukkah, New Years et al were glorious and special times for you and your families. Since the September picnic, our primary benefits focus has been revalidation of the MARS provided dental plans. Delta Dental's change in payment options resulted in us having Peliton Services (one of our benefits representatives) generate a detailed comparison study between Delta Dental and Beta Health. For those of you that participated in the dental plan survey I want to extend my sincere appreciation for your feedback. The committee composed of: Dave Martz, Allen Sanders, Don Jackson and Bo Rodriguez, reviewed a significant number of responses.

The following is a snapshot of the process used to reconcile those issues. Allen Sanders prepared a matrix based on the information received from each of the respondents and categorized the information for the two dental programs. Although our decision was not made based solely on popularity, the respondents revealed that 52% favored Delta Dental, 29% favored Beta Health. Nineteen percent (19%) did not have a preference one way or the other.

The feedback also indicated:

- A majority of members currently enrolled with Delta Dental were satisfied with their automatic premium payment process, some even preferring that process.
- Some members are still opposed to automatic payment withdrawal, although some who initially opposed it with Delta Dental are now using it.
- Many members who conferred with their dentist were informed that their dentist was not familiar with Beta Health or was not part of their provider network.
- A high percentage of members were not interested in discount dental plans which represent two of the Beta Health options and one of the Delta Dental options.

- Beta Health's Companion Life Dental Plan received favorable consideration from those members whose dentists are in the DenteMax network or whose dentists are not currently in any of the available Delta Dental or Beta Health networks.
- A number of members have a long standing patient/dentist relationship and did not want to risk interruption due to a dental program change.
- Some members expressed displeasure or concern with the administrative process within Delta Dental or the quality of service within the lower option discount plans.

After evaluating both plans and assessing survey feedback, the committee decided to continue using the Delta Dental of Colorado Plan. Please recall from the mailing information that neither plan would cover us with a group rate if they were not the exclusive MARS carrier. The current Delta Dental plan year ends on or about August 31, 2011. We will continue to evaluate and pursue the best benefits for future dental opportunities for our membership.

Keep in mind that at the beginning of the year, Delta will no longer accept checks as payment. Premiums will have to be made via credit card or direct deduction from your account.

Additional discounts and benefits can be found on the <u>Lockheed Martin Employee Service Center webpage</u>, where you first sign on with your SSN and PIN. After signing in, you'll see a menu item for "Retiree Discounts".

During this past year, there were occasional problems with vision care coverage. I'd like to request that all members currently enrolled in **VSP** take the time to check with both your optometrist/ophthalmologist and VSP to ensure, before the date of your actual appointment, that the member and covered family member is in fact recognized as covered.

As reported in the last issue of the MARS Star, a committee composed of officers and members of our Board of Directors have reviewed recent years

MARS membership applications to identify members who showed interest in serving MARS in the described positions. When contacted, some members expressed an interest; while, many members did not for various reasons. Although we were able to interest one member to serve in each of the officer positions, we were unable to gain enough candidates to require an officer election. With regard to the available Board of Directors positions, we were able to attract enough candidates to have an election.

Officers Elect

Vice-President — **Business** — Negotiate benefit plans and discounts for the organization for availability to the MARS membership and provide the benefit information to the membership. Conduct the nomination and election process for the Officers and Board of Directors; administer required state and federal documents as they apply to MARS Associates. Don Jackson, the incumbent has served out an unexpired 2-year term held by the previous officer. Don has elected not to run for a second 2 year term.

William Schrott has volunteered to fill the VP Business void.

Vice-President – Membership - Maintains the MARS membership database and maintains contact with potential members and solicits them for active membership in MARS. Polls members of MARS to ascertain interest in special activities that can be sponsored or arranged by MARS. Issue and sign membership cards to new members and supply mailing labels and event name tags, as required. Linda Stearns, the incumbent has elected not to run for a second 2-year term.

Barbara Espinoza volunteered to replace Linda. Linda however has volunteered to serve as the MARS Associates Secretary - an appointed position.

Vice President – Communications – Actively promotes good public relations within MARS. Prepares and publishs any internal periodicals; distributes periodicals to MARS members. Operate the Senior Information Center for the benefit of members. Provide, if possible, the publication of illness or death of members, in an internal periodical. Bonnie Snodgress, the incumbent has served two 2-year terms in office and cannot continue to serve in this capacity per the bylaws. Bob Snodgress volunteered to replace Bonnie.

Board of Directors

(3 positions) - Adopt and publish policies, rules and regulations governing the conduct of business

for MARS Associates and exercise all powers, duties and authority within the organization. Incumbents **David Martz** and **Bob Lines** are eligible to serve a second 2-year term and have expressed their interest to continue. Incumbent Bette Henson, has served two 2-year terms in office and cannot continue to serve in this capacity per the bylaws. **Terri Hamen** and **Albert Nemes** have both voiced interest in serving in this position.

Members of MARS Associates are needed to selfnominate to serve in the various positions that become available each year in order to have elections as our charter members intended many years ago. Our organization cannot sustain itself unless our members voluntarily participate more fully in leadership roles on our Board of Directors and/or Officers. We look forward to hearing from you.

During Barb's service with Lockheed Martin, she worked a variety of programs including Peacekeeper, Project Challenge, Electrical and Software Central Organizations (Home Shops). MARS-Affiliated Clubs and Volunteering

MARS Membership Unit

MARS membership is defined in the policy manual as a family unit consisting of the retiree and spouse (or significant other), although the membership card and mailing data are in the retiree's name. In the event that the retiree dies, the spouse becomes the member in his/her own name and may remain a MARS member by continuing to pay the annual dues. The senior status accorded a membership is based on the <u>retiree's</u> date of birth, even for a surviving spouse member.

Membership Renewal

Renewal forms are mailed in the *January* mailing. On your renewal form, please verify all of your personal information, including spouse or significant other and email address on your form, or if you no longer have an email address. Let me know of any changes to your email address even if you don't want it posted on the website.

Addresses & Phone Numbers

You can ensure that you receive all your STAR mailings, with newsletters, flyers and information about MARS and Lockheed Martin activities. Please notify us promptly by letter, e-mail or phone call of any email, address, or telephone number change and do not miss out on your MARS STAR mailings. If you regularly spend part of the year away from vour address of record. let us know what your alternate address is and when you are there. We will send your STAR mailing to that address! Every quarter, there are a number of packages that do not arrive because members' addresses have changed without our being aware and Standard mail is not forwarded. Historian's Corner

Unveiling the Mysteries of Saturn

The weather at Cape Canaveral was clear and quite warm in the hours before dawn on Wednesday, October 15, 1997. Powerful lights bathed Launch Complex LC-40 as the countdown continued for Titan launch vehicle TIVB-33 and its Centaur TC-21 upper stage. A very special payload awaited liftoff: The massive Cassini spacecraft and its companion Titan moon explorer, Huygens. At 4:43 am Eastern Time, the Solid Rocket Motors on TIVB-33 roared to life and Cassini/Huygens began its incredible journey to Saturn. [Photo 1 on cover]. The launch and spacecraft support teams from around the United States and from many other countries cheered as TIVB-33 cleared small clouds near the pad and accelerated across the sky. Approximately 48 minutes later, after two Centaur upper stage engine burns, the spacecraft successfully separated to begin its long journey to the ringed planet.

The Cassini/Huygens spacecraft was the largest exploration spacecraft ever launched by NASA, weighing over 12,000 pounds at liftoff. Cassini was named after the Italian/French astronomer Jean-Dominique Cassini (1625-1712), who discovered four of Saturn's moons and observed the rings. The Huygens probe honors Dutch astronomer Christiaan Huygens (1629-1695), who discovered the moon Cassini's size and outer solar system Titan. destination necessitated the use of the powerful Titan launch vehicle and Centaur upper stage, but it was still incapable of reaching Saturn directly, at nearly 900 million miles from Earth. Cassini also required an elaborate feat of navigation, a gravity assist trajectory that took the spacecraft by Venus (twice), back by Earth and finally past Jupiter on Dec 30, 2000, at last arriving at the Saturn system on Jul 1, 2004. [Photo 2 on cover] Cassini passed through the ring plane and went into orbit around Saturn: Cassini uses the large moon Titan as its focal point for the many orbits around the planet in its primary four-year mission and follow-on missions.

Science began in earnest upon arrival. Cassini has twelve scientific instruments used to examine Saturn, the rings and its moons in a variety of light conditions and light spectra (visible, infrared, radio waves, radar, ultraviolet) and also examine plasma fields, dust particles and the magnetosphere of the planet. Cassini relies on nuclear power for its electrical systems and to heat the instruments,

because of its destination in the outer solar system. The spacecraft uses three large Radioisotope Thermoelectric Generators (RTGs) that power the systems and components, creating electrical energy from the heat decay of Plutonium Dioxide. In addition, 157 small Radioisotope Heating Units on the spacecraft provide heat for the instruments and components. Prior to launch, NASA and its contractors performed many special analyses and impact assessments to ensure the safety of this system. Cassini was not the first spacecraft to use RTGs, nor is it the last, but it does have the largest nuclear system flown on any spacecraft so far, relying on more than 70 pounds of Plutonium 238.

One of the first major tasks after arrival was the deployment of the European Space Agency Huygens probe, a small probe with a parachute system and six instruments that descended through the thick Titan moon atmosphere on January 15, 2005. Huvgens sent back reams of data on the atmosphere of Titan and survived over an hour on the frigid surface. Titan, the second largest moon in the solar system, is of great interest to scientists because it is the only major moon with a thick atmosphere that includes many of the compounds that were present during the development of life on Earth, although conditions are much different in terms of sunlight and surface temperatures. [Photo 3]. As of January 2011, Cassini has performed 73 fly-bys of Titan, some at very close range. Cassini has also performed close and distant fly-bys of many of the other moons (62 moons at last count) and has done extensive monitoring of the ring system and the planet itself.

So what has Cassini discovered during its four-year primary mission, the two-year solstice mission and in its current equinox mission that ends in 2017? The findings are exhaustive and will keep scientists busy for decades; a few highlights include:

- 1) Titan has liquid lakes of ethane and methane, with associated weather systems ("methane" rains) and significant geological features, including possible "cryovolcanoes" (very cold temperatures) and hydrocarbon sand dunes.
- 2) The enigmatic moon Enceladus has an internal liquid water ocean, vents liquid water containing organic compounds from its southern pole region, has some of the youngest surface features of any solar system moon and creates the ghostly E-ring with its emissions. Enceladus and Europa (in the Jupiter system) are of great interest to scientists looking for life elsewhere in the solar system. [photo 4]

- 3) The rings are extraordinarily complex, with clumps of materials, tiny shepherd moons in the gaps, many small ringlets and even the presence of a tenuous atmosphere.
- 4) Saturn itself has huge, long-lasting electrical storms, atmospheric "waves" and bizarre hurricane-like structures at both poles.
- 5) Other moons of Saturn have unique features, including Iapetus (contrasting dark and light hemispheres and huge, linear mountain ranges), Mimas (significant surface temperature variations), and the icy moons of Rhea and Dionne (organic materials).

Cassini is one of the last "great planetary exploration missions", in the same category as the Viking Orbiters/Landers, the two Voyager Spacecraft and the Galileo mission to Jupiter. Under development for nearly twenty years and surviving numerous budget cuts, Cassini and its companion spacecraft Huvgens represent the culmination of rigorous systems design and development activities by agencies, companies, universities and individuals in 17 nations and 33 states. Lockheed Martin was a major contributor to this incredibly successful program, providing the launch vehicle, spacecraft integration and the main propulsion system for Cassini. 


Photo 3: Ethane/Methane lakes on Titan (radar image)




Photo 4: Enceladus venting from its south pole Photo Credit: NASA/JPL/Space Science Institute

Planner's Report

None of the planners submitted anything for this issue so I would like to tell you about rediscovering my love for reading and some suggestions.

Since retirement, I have the pleasure of reading an hour or so before bed. Something that I'm sure all of us were unable to do when we were working.

I could do many articles on my favorite authors, and may if I have nothing to write about, but for now let me talk about two writers of fiction.

The first is John Irving. He is my favorite American writer who has been praised for his Dickensian style. He has written over 14 works of fiction and nonfiction. He tells grand stories of characters that live in New England. You can Google him and find all his works but let me address my two favorites.

Cider House Rules is a charming and witty novel whose underlining theme is "women's rights" There was a movie made with the same title (available on DVD) which stars Michael Cain, and earned John Irving an Oscar for the Best Adaptive Screenplay. Great Movie! Great Book!

Another Irving novel, my #1 favorite, is *A Prayer for Owen Meany*. I re-read it, at least, every other Christmas. It is the story of two boys, best friends,

growing up in New Hampshire. It is complicated, hilarious and heart breaking. It never fails to make me laugh out loud and later cry. Its underlying themes are belief in God and the tragedy of war, specifically Vietnam. I read it around Christmas because of a section involving a children's Christmas pageant.

While reading it a few weeks ago I was struck by the similarity of what our leaders said then and what they say now. A movie was made covering only parts and is not worth your time. It is titled *Simon Birch*.

My second recommendation is author Stieg Larsson. His last 3 books, *The Girl With The Dragon Tattoo; The Girl Who Played With Fire;* and, *The Girl Who Kicked The Hornets Nest,* have all become international sensations as crime novels.

Stieg died of a heart attack before he reached his 50th birthday, and before the books were published. Very sad for him, not realizing his success, and sad for his fans that there will been no more novels (It is reported that he planned on writing 10). These 3 books have sold over 40 + million copies worldwide and sales are continuing to rise.

The heroine is 4'9", 90-pound wisp of a girl named Lizbeth Salander. Lizbeth dresses "punk rock", is anti-social, uncommunicative, and determined to do things her way. She is a "computer hacker" extraordinaire, and doesn't take s**t from anyone. The 1st book involves her and a journalist, Mikael Bloomkvist, taking on a 40-year-old abduction and murder of a teenage girl.

The second book deals with Lizbeth being accused of 3 murders and the third book with her, mostly non-violent, revenge. The books are translated from Swedish and take place in Sweden, so I would strongly suggest that you get a map of Sweden. I got mine at AAA.

When reading an American novel and the author says, "I'm going to Cleveland", you know where he's going. When Salandar says, "I'm going to Uppsala, or Malmo, or Goteborg," you better have a map!

The first two books are in paperback and the third is still in hardback. The waiting list at your local Library for any of the 3 books is very, very long.

There are also 2 maps online, which are very helpful, in reading the 1st novel, by detailing the fictitious island of Hedeby. Both the island and the town of Hedestad are fictional places.

Like Russian novels, these have names that are unfamiliar and hard to pronounce. You may want to jot down the supporting characters. I have read all three books and have also listened to recorded editions so that I could hear how the names and places were pronounced and to better understand the intricacies of the novels.

All three have been made into Swedish language movies with the same actors for all three. The first two are available on DVD. The 3rd is currently in theaters and the DVD is scheduled to release in late January 2011. The movies are good with the 3rd earning the highest praise.

I recommend, as with any movie made from a book, reading the book first, but if you're not a reader or you can't wait to get the book through the library, you can still enjoy the films.

I have found that the English dubbed setting, with or without subtitles, is the best way to view them. Swedish is pretty distracting to hear (unless you're Swedish) and the dubbed version is very well done.

These 3 novels by Larsson are complicated, but very rewarding. I have yet to meet a person who has not loved the books and especially Salander. She is the most extraordinary heroine I have ever met. It's best if you read the books and see the movies in order.

Perhaps the greatest compliment to the popularity of the books is that the *Girl With The Dragon Tattoo* movie is current being re-made by Hollywood, with Daniel Craig and Rooney Mara as Bloomkvist and Salander.

Both of these authors write detailed and intricate stories with many subplots. At times, like in the beginning of *The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo,* you wonder why we are dealing with a libel charge against Bloomkvist. Read with "faith", as it all comes together. Enjoy!

FREE SOFTWARE: I thought that would get your attention. I'm writing this column with free software that I thought you'd be interested in knowing about. And, when I make changes to the web pages for which I'm responsible, I've been doing that with free software too.

So, what are they? The first is software called "OpenOffice." It is essentially Microsoft Office. It has a word processing program called Writer, which I'm using now, a spreadsheet program called Calc, a Database program called Base, a graphics program named Draw, and a presentation program named Impress and it is a <u>free</u> download. To obtain an equivalent program from Microsoft, including a database, costs about \$400. OpenOffice may be downloaded from OpenOffice.com. Frequent

updates are also available at this same URL. "The suite started out as a proprietary product called StarOffice developed by StarDivision in Germany, but this changed when it was purchased by Sun Microsystems in 1999. Sun released the software under a permissive license in 2000 in the hope of gathering a community of developers around the application that would then build and improve upon it, allowing it to emulate the success of other open source projects such as the Mozilla browser suite, which spawned Firefox. The intention of the project is to compete with Microsoft Office, and it therefore borrows much of the structure of Microsoft's flagship suite and also supports its file formats. The latest version of OpenOffice.org can open files created using Microsoft Office 2007. OpenOffice.org's native formats - collectively called the Open Document Format (ODF) have been adopted as an international standard and are in use across a growing range of applications. It has been released for Windows, Linux, Solaris, and Mac OS X." * (*Ref: Beginning OpenOffice 3, A. Channelle, 2009, Apress)

The second free program is "Komposer." Kompozer is an open source web development tool built on NewView, which I also used for awhile. It is easy to use and includes one-button publishing. It has been released for Windows and Mac PPC but not Intel Mac.

United Launch Alliance News

United Launch Alliance Enters its Fifth Year with 45 Launches in 48 Months of Operation

As 2010 nears its end, United Launch Alliance (ULA) celebrates its fourth anniversary with 45 successful launches. ULA closed out 2010 in impressive fashion with the launch of the fourth Delta IV Heavy in

program history. The Nov. 21 launch capped a year of 100 percent mission success, including the launch of four Atlas V, one Delta II and three Delta IV rockets.

Among the 2010 payloads were several "firsts" for the Air Force including the first next generation GPS satellite, the first Advanced Extremely High Frequency satellite and the first Orbital Test Vehicle. Two launches each for NASA and the National Reconnaissance Office and a commercial launch completed the year.

In addition to eight launch successes in 2010, ULA also achieved many other accomplishments this year, including:

- A \$6.7 million contract award from NASA to participate in the Commercial Crew Development (CCDev) program for the development of an Emergency Detection System (EDS), which is the final significant element necessary for a safe and highly reliable human-rated launch vehicle.
- The celebration of 50 years of launch for one of the most successful rocket programs in U.S. history—the Delta program, which began with its first launch May 13, 1960. The launch of the 350th Delta rocket also occurred in the program's 50th anniversary year with the launch of COSMO-SkyMed 4 aboard a Delta II.
- The launch contract award for the first Block II and fourth Wideband Global SATCOM (WGS-4) satellite. The WGS system is the first satellite constellation to launch on both the Atlas and Delta vehicles since ULA's inception, demonstrating our operational flexibility.
- Further support of NASA's Mars exploration programs with the launch contract award for the Mars Atmosphere and Volatile Evolution (MAVEN) mission.
- Participation in President Obama's Change the Equation (CTEq) program, a CEO-led initiative to cultivate widespread literacy in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) across the nation.
- The evaluation and implementation of slot manifesting initiatives to enhance overall manifest scheduling responsiveness in coordination with key customers.
- Membership with the Commercial Spaceflight Federation to strengthen business relationships with ULA's existing commercial partners

- including Bigelow Aerospace, Sierra Nevada Corporation, Space Florida and XCOR Aerospace.
- The launch of the 25-foot tall, 240-pound "Future" high-power rocket—the largest rocket ever launched from Colorado—designed, built and launched by ULA interns.
- The presentation of the 2010 AIAA George M. Low Space Transportation Award to ULA President and CEO Michael Gass for his leadership in combining the Atlas V and Delta II and IV launch vehicle programs while executing launches with 100 percent mission success.
- An Aviation Week ranking as third best company for "Valuing the Individual" in the publication's annual feature, "Where Aerospace & Defense Professionals Want to Work."
- More than 24,000 donated volunteer hours and \$150,000 to non-profits across the country from ULA's matching time program, and contributions totaling \$659,000 in the company's annual United Way campaign. Additionally, the company donated to more than 110 non-profits nationwide through the company's other corporate citizenship programs.

"These accomplishments were no easy feat and are testament to the hard work and dedication of our 3,700 employees with whom I am privileged to work with every day at ULA," said Michael Gass, ULA president and chief executive officer. "We strive to provide our government and commercial customers with reliable access to space, one launch at a time, and the combined expertise of everyone on the ULA team is the reason for our sustained mission success. As we celebrate our fourth anniversary, I am extremely proud of our company's 45 successful launches to date and all that our team has achieved in 2010. I look forward to making 2011 even better."

ULA will begin 2011 with another notable accomplishment as the first-ever West Coast Delta IV Heavy is launched from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., scheduled for Jan. 17, 2011. There are five Atlas V, three Delta II and three Delta IV launches currently planned in 2011.
