## Medicare/LMT Retiree Health Plan Changes for 2012

We Lockheed Martin retirees over 65 get our health insurance from one or both of two sources: Medicare and the Lockheed Martin Retiree Health Plan. Both Medicare and LM plans have open enrollment periods coming up in October-December and the plan details change from year-to-year, both in costs and benefits. At the time of this writing (10/2/2011), we know a lot about the 2012 Medicare Prescription Drug Plans (PDP) and Medicare Health Plans, but not much about Medicare part B premiums, co-pays and deductibles, nor any changes to the LM Retiree Health Plans. (The Medicare Medigap plans don't have an upcoming

open enrollment period and you can find out about them on <a href="www.Medicare.gov">www.Medicare.gov</a> and on <a href="www.dora.state.co.us/insurance/">www.dora.state.co.us/insurance/</a>.) So now we'll tell you what we know about the upcoming 2012 plans and publish updates on the MARS website as we learn more.

#### **Medicare PDP Changes:**

The Medicare PDP guidelines for 2012 have been published as a Standard Benefit Model Plan and the highlights can be found at <a href="https://www.q1medicare.com/PartD-The-2012-Medicare-Part-D-Outlook.php">www.q1medicare.com/PartD-The-2012-Medicare-Part-D-Outlook.php</a>. There are no major changes this year, but three changes of interest for 2012 are:

- Costs will increase a little; i.e., initial deductible up by \$10 to \$320.
- Some additional benefits have been added. Start
  of the coverage gap (donut hole) will increase by
  \$90 to \$2930, the discount on generic drugs while
  in the coverage gap increases to 14% (from 7% in
  2012), and the discount on Brand name drugs in
  the coverage gap remains at 50%.

Note that to date the LM Prescription drug plan included with the LM Health plans does not have a coverage gap, a potentially significant benefit to those who take multiple or expensive drugs.

Companies that will operate in Colorado for 2012 have announced their PDP plans. These 14 companies will offer 28 different plans at least as good as the Medicare Standard Benefit Model. The monthly premiums for the PDPs range from \$15.10 to \$105.40 per month, a slight increase from last year, each have different deductibles and Gap coverage.

If you have a standalone Medicare PDP now and want to change your plan, you will need to enroll between Oct 15 and Dec 7 (2 weeks earlier than 2011), effective Jan. 1, 2012. If you don't want to change your PDP, you can do nothing and your current plan will continue into 2012, but the costs may be different. All PDP participants are encouraged to re-evaluate their plans each year during open enrollment to see if their current plan is still the most cost effective and that the drugs they need are still on the plan's formulary. You can do re-evaluation vourself online www.Medicare.gov using the PlanFinder feature or you can call the local SHIP office (in Denver 303-329-4940) and they will do it for you.

Note that the LM Health Plans include a Prescription Drug benefit so if you decide on an LM Health plan you don't need to be concerned about a Medicare PDP. In fact, if you enrolled in a Medicare PDP you would be dis-enrolled from the LM Plan. (Medicare subsidizes both plans and they won't pay twice!)

#### **Medicare Health Plan Changes**

These are the Medicare Advantage Plans like Kaiser, AARP United HealthCare Secure Horizons. The plans available to a beneficiary depends on your zip code, but for 2012 there are 11 different companies offering 31 different plans in Colorado, including HMOs\*, PPOs\*, PFFSs\* and Cost Plans (Rocky Mountain Health Plans). The monthly premiums announced to date range from \$0 to \$246 per month, with varying copays, deductibles, and health and drug benefits. Some details of these plans are available now on pg 144 of the Colorado 2012 "Medicare and You" book mailed to most Medicare beneficiaries already, and more detailed information is now available on Medicare.gov, including plan availability by zip code. The open enrollment period for these plans starts Oct 15 and ends Dec. 7 (2 weeks earlier than 2011), and the plans would be effective Jan.1, 2012. If you are already enrolled in a plan, no action is necessary, but it pays to examine the costs and benefits each year to see if the plan you have is still the most cost effective, using Medicare.gov. Call your local SHIP office (303-629-4940) for help with this determination.

Note that in the past LM has offered versions of two of these Medicare Health Plans to LM retirees in Colorado: Kaiser Senior HMO and PacifiCare Secure Horizons Senior HMO, both with a drug plan The Colorado Medicare Kaiser Plan is rated 5 Stars in the 2012 "Medicare and You" listings, the Medicare United HealthCare Secure Horizons Plan is rated 4 Stars. Note that the 2011 LM Secure Horizons Plan is offered by PacifiCare, not United HealthCare, so extrapolating the rating may not be realistic. New this year, starting Dec 8, 2011 and continuing through 2012, you can switch to a 5 star Medicare Advantage Plan (only Kaiser and Ericson in Colorado) at any time of the year (but just once) if it is available in your zip code (pg 79 of 2012 Medicare & You). Starting in 2012, Medicare will provide bonus payments to those Advantage Plans that achieve 4 or 5 Star ratings.

#### **Lockheed Martin Health Plan Changes**

LM has typically sent the annual enrollment package to retirees in October or November. We have no information at this time that would indicate any major changes in the Health Plan offerings for Colorado retirees. We will put information on the Mars website when it is available.

#### **Further Information**

Peliton, Delta Dental, SAMS, and Kaiser Permanente representatives were there to answer your questions about the services they provide and supply the enrollment forms needed to sign up for these services. There were free items and raffle items provided by these representatives. The free items ranged from candy, tooth brushes, vitamins, and ballpoint pens.

We did have a slight problem that occurred. While all these representatives were at their respective tables, the sprinkler system in the park turned on. Sprinklers were turned off in a short time. The representatives were good sports and survived the soaking. They did want to know what I had planned for next year.

The month of August was sign up time for Delta Dental. There has been a rush of retirees calling for information and enrollment forms. Here are a few points to help you understand your status with Delta Dental:

- 1) The dental plan design and cost for 2012 is unchanged from last year since the period of coverage is for two years (2011 and 2012).
- 2) If you were enrolled in 2011and wish to remain enrolled in 2012 you do not need to re-enroll.
- 3) The open enrollment information provided in our last mailing of the MARS Star was intended for those members new and/or not currently enrolled in the Delta Dental of Colorado plan.
- 4) If you recently retired and are a MARS member, you can enroll into Delta Dental within 60 days of your retirement.

I have received some suggestions for additional or modified Delta Dental services. As we get closer to the 2013 sign up time, we'll be setting down with Delta Dental to review design and cost for 2013. At that time the suggested changes will be reviewed and any cost change assessed.

Election of new Officers and Board of Directors for 2012 will soon be upon us. There are a few positions that will have to be filled in 2012. Nominations for MARS Associate Officers and Board of Directors are being sought for the 2012 election year for the following positions.

#### **Officers**

**President Elect** – Performs all duties and responsibilities of the President in the absence of the President; conducts liaison with other Lockheed Martin Corporation retiree organizations; plans, promotes, and oversees organized group activities; assists the President as required. **Allen Sanders,** the incumbent **will assume the position of President** per the By-Laws of the organization.

**Treasurer** – Maintains custody of monies and securities for MARS; keeps accounting records and submits regular reports to the Officers and Board of Directors of the organization. **Duane Del Duca,** the incumbent, has completed his second 2-year term.

#### **Historian's Corner**

#### **Space Program Animal Heroes**

Did you know that The Martin Company (Denver) had an animal research center for a few years in the early 1960's? The research center was approximately where Chatfield Reservoir is currently located. The facilities activities supported the Gemini Program. Life Sciences and Human Factors had centers in Baltimore MD and Denver CO.

Think back to 1961, May 25<sup>th</sup> to be exact. - President Kennedy announced before a special joint session of Congress the dramatic and ambitious goal of sending an American safely to the Moon before the end of the decade. The nation was energized.

The effect of space travel on man was an unknown then. Would space adventurer's brain waves be impacted? What was the effect of space on the human blood pressure? Certain physiological questions needed to be answered prior to sending our first man into space. The Martin Company Animal Research Center existed to help answer these and other questions about space travel for mankind- too many to mention here.

The center was headed by Dr. Harry Gorman a highly respected medical professional in the veterinary field, and a pioneer in artificial hip surgery. Dr. Gorman's Registered Nurses were Neva Gentry and Elsie J. Cossaboom, my mother. Mother, wanting a nursing change (she was a WWII Army Nurse) took the opportunity to play a part in getting the USA to the moon.

In this day and age, people conjured up horrible visions of abuse when they thought of animal research. This certainly was not the case with the Martin Company. All of the dogs were rescued from shelters and most had been abused by their owners. I don't know where the monkeys came from but they sure didn't like me! Mice were also studied as generational effects and could be studied quickly.

I was a boy of 9 or 10 in those days, and my brother and I (of course The Martin Company Security organization had to approve us) were able to go out to the center one weekend a month, when it was mothers' weekend rotation; to feed the animals and clean the cages while Mother tended to the animals in the clinic. It was fascinating for this young boy and I wanted to work at this company when I 'grew up'- to be a part of the space program.

Lady was a beautiful and kind dog who stole everyone's heart. In this picture, my mother helps test the telemetry system with an assist from Lady. Note the bulky receiver mother is holding and the antenna under Lady.



I believe the center closed in 1963 having developed a method by which animal blood pressures could be taken in space and how brain waves could be monitored. All of the dogs were found good homes to live out their remaining years. All the monkeys were given to local zoos.

The Martin Company presented at the 34<sup>th</sup> Annual Scientific Meeting of the Aerospace Medical Association in Los Angeles California, April 29-May 2, 1963. The subject of the conference was "Life Sciences and Human Factors".

I think often of the unsung animal heroes, who gave of themselves, be it a dog on the ground or a brave monkey taking a guick ride into space.

Did you know?

- The Martin Company was a pioneering entity in the development of solar panels?
- The Martin Company developed a nonocclusive, non-invasive blood pressure measuring system? The data being transmitted by RF telemetry?
- The Martin Company also developed a variable torque simulator in 1962? The picture of that is a real riot! And torque issues still continue to rear up even today!
- Eight Four Nine
- The Martin Company developed a Space Cabin Simulator?
- In Baltimore, the Martin Company's Space Systems Division developed a two-man mooncraft model to simulate the critical rendezvous and docking steps of lunar landing mission?

Here, Dr. Gorman is 'instructing one of his prized test subjects before placing him in the small animal chamber in the Space Cabin Simulator.' To the right is the Space Cabin Simulator which could (and did) accommodate both animal and human heroes.

"I remember getting to go out to Martin Marietta with Mrs. Cossaboom and daughter Nancy, a couple of times, to help feed and clean the cages. It was quite a treat to help with the animals, they were so excited to see us, at least the dogs were; the monkeys kind of scared me so I stayed clear of them."
