




MARS Membership Unit

MARS membership is defined in the policy manual as a family unit consisting of the retiree and spouse (or significant other), although the membership card and mailing data are in the retiree's name. In the event the retiree dies, the spouse becomes the member in his/her own name and may remain a MARS member by continuing to pay the annual dues. Senior membership status (age 75 and above) is based on the <u>retiree's</u> date of birth, even for the surviving spouse member.

San Juan Oct. 2011- Fly-fishing with Dottie

We drove down on Wed. 19 Oct0ber - Just Dot and

Merriam off on a new adventure.

Great ride down. As we came off Kenosha Pass there was South Park spread out before us. Cattle, antelope and we think a small herd of elk. The mountains to the west had a dusting of new snow so the jagged structure of the rock still showed thru, awesome as ever. Later, coming down to the Arkansas River we were treated with a look at Mt Antero with its treasures of Aquamarine blue crystals. The cottonwood trees along the river were in full orange foliage, bright in the sunlight.

Another treat waited at the top of Poncha Pass where the San Luis Valley spreads out between the Sangre de Cristo Mountains on the left, also bright white and the lower Saguache range to the right. One small herd of antelope was seen and Blanca Peak and the Sand Dunes in the distance. Crossing the Rio Grande the colorful cottonwoods greeted us again all the way to Wolf Creek Pass.

Deep snow in the woods from 10,000 feet up and the ski area is ready to go. There were spectacular aspen yellows, greens, and touches of red on the way down. Entire mountainsides at the peak of aspen color laid out just for our delight.

Then pie, coffee and gas in Pagosa Springs for the route thru Duice, the Apache reservation, and on to the overlook at the Navajo Dam and its tail-waters where we were to fish. We passed many gas wells, part of the 35,000 wells in the San Juan basin going down to Farmington. The earth filled dam is several hundred feet high and creates Navajo Lake which provides irrigation all the way to Shiprock. I showed Dottie my panoramic photos marked up with notes: "Dry files here, you can wade across there belly deep; here is where I fell in; use San Juan worm in this run". This is only the second time this lady has been on a premier trout fishing river and she was eager to get going. It was pretty late so we settled for bunking at the Fisheads resort and restaurant chow.

We had three days and did wade fishing and with a guide in his boat. The best time was wading the shallow back channel at the Munoz parking area. Just a short walk from the car brings you to the trail to the water and we had it all to ourselves.

We could see several trout rising and nymphing just below the surface. Some of the trout could be clearly seen. Some were probably 20 inches in length, a trophy anywhere. The water was only knee deep with weed beds for cover and some deeper holes. It was a trout heaven for sure. Dottie knows how to cast. As her guide, I rigged up her outfit. Her rod had a tapered leader down to 6x which is pretty thin. Since the water was what we call slick with no ripples and shallow I tied on a two foot tippet of 7x. This is only one step heavier than a spiderweb and has a strength of one and a half pounds - Just the ticket for these conditions. I tied on the tiniest dry fly that they make, a Number 26 Parachute Adams.

Dottie repeatedly cast to a nice trout that was feeding 20 feet away. It not only did not take her fly but did take one about six inches from hers. I looked carefully at the flow where we were standing and when your eyes are a foot or eighteen inches from the surface you see many odd and wonderful things. Some insects were only 1/16th of an inch long, probably not what the large trout were feeding on. Others were half the size of her fly. So it was time to resort to the ultimate "San Juan river trick". I took her little fly and using my clippers I cut off half the feathers, the tail, and the white parachute on top. Now it would be numbered as a 32.

Dot made a few back casts and placed it gently about three feet above the fish. Wait, wait, SPLASH, the fish was on. It took off upstream with line coming off the reel making the finest hum you love to hear. He took all the fly line and 50 feet of backing then jumped flashing his rainbow colors in the sunlight. When he came back downstream Dottie reeled like mad to keep tension on the line and the hook. After about fifteen minutes I was able to net him for her so we could admire that 19 inch rainbow, free the hook and let him swim away so that we may meet again another day.

I caught a couple and then she got near another nice fish. This time she had on a Number 26 grey nymph with a tiny bit of soft lead to break the surface tension and let it sink just below the surface. This trout didn't want it so she went thirty feet upstream to another trout. This one made a big subsurface swirl as he took the nymph and treated us to the same kind of performance as the first. Then the wind came up, surface action ceased and it was time to head for Aztec.

About the guide and the boat - he only fishes the Texas Hole. It is 17 ft deep 200 yards long with big fast current in the middle and back eddies on the sides. The deal here is a fly with 2 small split shot suspended 8 ft below a "thIngamabobber". You throw out near the fast water at the head of the run and then float downstream watching the bobber until the rig drags bottom. Then he rows back up

and tells you "watch the bobber". After an hour of this with no action, the boredom quotient was extreme. We spent half a day with this and got three fish. Never again!!

In Aztec I wanted to show Dottie the Anasazi ruins that contain over 100 rooms that are 1,000 years old. The best feature there is the Great Kiva that has been reconstructed. It is a below ground circular structure for religious ceremonies as are the small family kivas like those at Mesa Verde. This one is huge, 100 feet in diameter. The roof is supported by four pilasters - twenty feet high. They are four feet square and constructed with alternate layers of 3" diameter wood poles and carefully finished rocks - An amazing structure.

Chaco Canyon National Park was the next day. From Farmington it's about 70 miles, 16 of it dirt washboard.

The canyon goes for ten miles or so and is less than 1/2 mile wide. The floor is flat except for the winding watercourse in the center about 20 feet deep. In olden days there must have been a wetter climate with steady irrigation available. There are over ten ruins; the largest is Pueblo Bonito with six hundred rooms, some four stories high. One back wall still stands four stories high. There are many kivas and plazas. Archeologists have found 150 houses scattered around the Cuba, Gallup, Shiprock, and Aztec area. There must have been thousands of people in this flourishing civilization and all of them knew they would be there forever. Just as we feel today.

Building started about 800 AD, peaked in 1100 and disappeared in 1200 due to a 70-year drought. The same fate has befallen many cultures around the globe. Is it the Malthus theory that we breed faster than we can provide the food? Is overpopulation a big problem today? Is China the only country trying to control this situation? Does anyone care?

We walked thru the ruins, awed from knowing they are 1000 years old. There were two little purple asters growing in the desert by the trail so we left a bright "good luck" penny by each one.

The dancing raven put on a show for us as we departed. He was flying just below the rim of the canyon's rock wall. The blue sky above and bright sun made his dark shadow. The walls are jagged going in and out, and so his shadow was high close to him when he was close to the rock. The shadow danced way down when he crossed an opening in

the wall. We watched him for three hundred yards entranced by this dancing shadow.

Coming home we did the Durango to Silverton trip by car, not the narrow gage. Then we went over Red Mountain to Ouray with lots of abandoned mines along the way. Why? With gold at \$1700 per ounce perhaps some could reopen. Anyone want to go down a 100 year old mineshaft to see if the timbers are still robust? Nah! Finally past Paonia, there are lots of coal mines being worked. Glad we worked on spacecraft above ground. Good trip, just car and gas.

United Launch Alliance Celebrates Five Years of Mission Success, 56 Launches in 60 Months

United Launch Alliance was formed just five years ago, bringing together the world's two most experienced launch teams and two highly reliable launch systems, Atlas and Delta. ULA's unparalleled recipe of experience is built on the Atlas and Delta legacy of 1,300 launches during the past five decades, propelled by ULA employees and suppliers located in 46 states.

ULA's impressive record of success lies in the 56 successful launches the company has achieved in just 60 months. In total, ULA has launched 30 national security missions, 17 NASA missions and nine commercial missions.

"We're very proud of the record ULA team has amassed over the past five years," said ULA President and CEO Michael Gass. "Just this year, ULA has launched 11 missions with nearly 20 billion dollars of critical, irreplaceable assets, all of which were safely delivered to orbit. In addition to the satellite market, ULA is continuing its role in commercial human spaceflight and progress in human-rating the Atlas V vehicle to launch crews to the International Space Station.

'The Atlas V vehicle is the lowest risk approach to developing a commercial crew capability over the next several years," Gass said. 'Atlas V is the launch vehicle of choice of three of four Commercial Crew Development (CCDEV) teams, including Boeing, Blue Origin and Sierra Nevada."

"We are honored to serve our customer and our country," said Gass. "We will continue to provide innovative, cost-effective, reliable missions for our customers and are laser-focused on providing mission success – one launch at a time."

ULA program management, engineering, test, and mission support functions are headquartered in Denver, Colo. Manufacturing, assembly and integration operations are located at Decatur, Ala., and Harlingen, Texas. Launch operations are located at Cape Canaveral AFS, Fla., and Vandenberg AFB, Calif.
