

MARS Membership Unit

MARS membership is defined in the policy manual as a family unit consisting of the retiree and spouse (or significant other), although the membership card and mailing data are in the retiree's name. In the event the retiree dies, the spouse becomes the member in his/her own name and may remain a MARS member by continuing to pay the annual dues. Senior membership status (age 75 and above) is based on the <u>retiree's</u> date of birth, even for the surviving spouse member.

Membership Renewal

If you have friends who are retired or considering retirement, talk to them about the advantages of being a MARS member. We are a social organization; however, the benefits offered such as vision and dental insurance and discounts provided by some organizations are significant. If they are unable to access the membership application on the MARS website, I will be happy to send an application by mail.

Historian's Corner

An Interview with...

Historian Note: This month we hear from Don and Ruth Veasman. Don worked as a Mechanical Technician for Titan I and Titan II in such areas as Final Assembly, Small Parts, and Hydro. Don left Martin Marietta in 1962....Ruth's career with Martin Marietta began in 1967. Ruth worked a series of assignments such as Administrative Assistant, Planner, and Statistician, supporting our Engineering organization. She played a prominent role in the early days of Operation Santa Claus; and was also Editor of the Engineering Monitor, a 1970's newsletter. Ruth retired in 1978. I am sure that all of us will relate to Don and Ruth's dedication regardless of what our responsibilities were. This is what has made us a family and proud members of this corporation.

Titan I and Titan II Production

Don: I did a couple tours of duty at what was then known as Martin Marietta. I first came on board for less than two dollars an hour in 1957 along with a cost of living adjustment. The company had a training facility near the Englewood Speedway (now the approximate site of Federal and Oxford). We were trained for two weeks before we could report to our jobs at the Waterton Plant. I was assigned a position in Small Parts.

I still remember my badge number from those first days! I was happy to be at Martin Marietta as they were known as a good employer who valued the talents of their workforce.

At this time, the company was building, testing, and assembling the Titan I for delivery and launch. In Small Parts in those days, we would build covers, boxes, and other so-called smaller but no less important items for this launch vehicle. And yes, we had lots and lots of overtime! Overtime became part of my family's vocabulary!

Don: In 1961-62, I was again working at Martin Marietta. The pace of the factory had picked up frantically. The company was now producing Titan I and Titan II launch vehicles. The factory floor was full to the brim with two different launch vehicle designs going through different phases of manufacture, assembly, and test. I worked Final

Assembly and Hydro in my capacity as a mechanical technician. I can still visualize the big fuel tanks and the Stage I engine ring work on the Titan I. I even remember the part number of the engine ring: 80000023. Those were busy but rewarding days.

Ruth: 1967 found me at Martin Marietta as a support staffer assigned to the Engineering organization. I over time became responsible for forecasting engineering manpower needs and weekly 'headcount' reports for various programs. Of course there were also other tasks such as preparing Executive Reports and condensing TAB RUN reports to facilitate a rapid executive review. Wish I would have had a computer in those days!

I am as proud of my efforts supporting Engineering for the Skylab program as Don is of his efforts in support of the Titan I and II efforts. Many people do not realize that Skylab had a crew of astronauts that supported this first U. S. Space Station! These were the early years of the 1970's. I still have an original picture of the Skylab astronauts autographed by them all, in my collection.

I also became editor of the Engineering Monitor, the Engineering newsletter.

Don: Those years were years of growth for Martin Marietta here in Littleton. I remember my first badge number was in the four thousand range and upon my return just a year or so later, my new badge number was in the thirteen thousand range! My wife's badge number was in the fifty thousand range and I hear Bill's was in the sixty thousand range! Talk about years of growth!

Ruth: I attended the 1973 'Family Day' at Martin Marietta. I took Don and my children and it was so much fun. I am glad to hear that at least until the 1990's that family day continued. Good day; good memories.

Don: These were also years that we met so many, many wonderful people whom Ruth and I grew to respect and value as friends, among them were Joy Martz, Bill Kistler (recently retired after 50+ years), and Ken SedImayr (who was also one of the original supporting Managers of Operation Santa Claus).

Operation Santa Claus:

<u>Historian Note</u>: Operation Santa Claus appears to have solidified through efforts initiated by at least two Engineering disciplines and other organizations. In any event, we may now celebrate this community effort; its history, and the people who not only made that history, but are still making history today via the corporations' commitment to those in need of a helping hand.

Ruth: Ken SedImayr asked me to support Engineering participation in Operation Santa Claus in 1971. The effort had begun in 1958 with a few departments involved to become a company sponsored initiative by 1971.

I have a newsletter, (the Engineering *Monitor*) that states that in 1971, \$5,314.73 was collected and seventy-three families with a combined total of 330 children received a holiday dinner with presents. Of course that was our engineering department. Another engineering department (Design Engineering) had a similar program.

I loved supporting Operation Santa Claus as the holidays were so important for me to share with my husband and children. But at times, that support could be difficult as I had to make some hard decisions.

At that time, referrals to Operation Santa Claus came mainly from what was then known as Denver Welfare and also from a few other county and charitable organizations. My duty was to go through the voluminous referrals received and somehow 'cull out' and send forward to the selection committee those final referrals. I would go through the referrals and sometimes cry at my desk as I spoke with those who had referred the cases to Martin Marietta. I then would forward the most critical referrals to the Santa Claus management committee. There were no restrictions on eligibility only need was taken into account.

The committee decided which families were to receive the benefits of Operation Santa Claus for the upcoming holiday. The committee would then select which referrals were to receive the Operation Santa Claus gift of a food basket and toys for the children.

Ruth: In December 1971, I participated in Operation Santa Claus by delivering food and toys to a Littleton family. It was a most touching and rewarding experience. The mother, with tears of gratitude in her eyes, asked me to stay awhile and talk to her. I was glad I did as I listened to her explanation of her case history. She, like many others, had fallen into difficult circumstances through no fault of her own. The situation was one that could happen to any of us. This time when I cried, it was with tears of joy as I knew Martin Marietta was giving the joy of a holiday.

Thailand – Land of Smiles - Continued

October 8, 2011 Day 7 of our 16 day tour of Thailand.

After a western style breakfast, we boarded our bus and left the deluxe Hintok River Camp for what was the longest leg of our trip. We were heading north, in the center of Thailand, through rice country. Because of the monsoon rains, we had to backtrack on a number of roads that had flooded, but our bus driver was very good at finding back and side roads. I enjoyed taking the "roads less travelled", as it seemed more of an earlier time. Our Kaiser medical department had prescribed antimalaria tables to take as we traveled north, but in talking to Mai, we decided that bug spray on our clothes and exposed areas would do the trick. Mai in all her touring has never contracted malaria, nor have her past clients. I had taken the medication in Africa and didn't like the side effects of nausea, headache, diarrhea, weakness, and dizziness. So we chose to "watch out for flying bugs". Good advice anywhere and anytime!

For lunch we stopped and boarded a traditional wooden rice barge that had been converted to an outdoor restaurant for another great meal, as we cruised past peaceful scenes of river life. It was a nice break from the road.

We arrived at our hotel in Phitsanulok late evening, where we had our dinner. Then we went to bed after the long bus ride.

The following morning we traveled a short distance to Sukhothai Historical Park. Sukhothai is considered the birthplace of Thai culture. The park preserves what's left of the 1st capital of Siam, and is a UNESCO World Heritage Site. The site features temples, palaces, stupas, and awesome Buddha statues, some four to five stories in height. There are 193 ruins in total, in a city that flourished between the mid 13th and mid 14th century. Between and around some of the structures are water ponds and water moats, with wooden bridges to get you over the moats. The park was beautiful and a definite plus of the trip. To return to our bus at the park entrance, we were treated to a ride in a "Skylab". That's right a "Skylab"! A Skylab is a rickshaw with a motor scooter in front and the passengers behind the driver. Mia didn't know how it got the name but it sure was funny to hear it, half way around the world.

After a full morning at Sukhothai, we lunched at a river view restaurant and visited an Indigo workshop. Here hand-woven cotton is dyed and stamped with Indigo dye. We got a chance to use an elephant stamp and test our design abilities. Of course we could also purchase beautiful shawls and scarves at really low prices. Then back on the bus to Phrae, Thailand. The trip is through hilly and densely forested terrain on a curvy two-lane road. It was very scenic.

This is a good place to talk about the "munchies" on the bus. Whenever we were traveling between towns or sites, Mia would pass around Thailand treats to taste. Sampling such treats as: Banana flitter, Mangoesteen (Queen of Thai fruit) sweet & salty, banana chips, sweet taro root chips, pumpkin chips, and rice crackers. All were tasty and very common in the Thai diet, and usually a snack we "fa-rangs" (foreigners) would be afraid to buy ourselves.

The town of Phrae has a population of about 18,000. It is more of a business town rather than a tourist stop. The Hotel, The Maeyom Palace although OK, was our least favorite. To be fair some floors of the hotel were being remodeled, but our room had electrical wires visible and in a jumble at some connections and beneath our bedside table. "Scary!"

Day 9 – October 10: After breakfast and before leaving Phrae to travel to Chiang Rai, we stopped at a market to play a game. The couples were each given a slip of paper with a fruit or veggie written in Thai. We were also supplied with 10 baht. The object: Find and buy the item. Ours was "gratiem".

"Now picture this scene in your mind.

Six old couples and three old singles running through a busy open market trying to find a native who spoke English and would help them find an ingredient that the fa-rangs couldn't read or pronounce! It was hilarious!

The Thai vendors were helpful, pointing which way to head. Quickly an English speaking Thai greeted us with a smile, looked at our slip of paper and led us to the proper vendor, staying with us until the product was purchased, using "Sib Baht" (10 Baht), and then led us back to Mia, through laughing vendors and customers.

For those who are curious "ma-nao" is garlic.

All the stuff we purchased was used later to prepare "Som-tam" (green papaya salad) at our home hosted lunch.

After the market we boarded the bus to visit the "Baan Boon Ya Park Pre-school". Kids, of course are a delight, especially when they're not yours. These were dressed in blue shorts and pink tee shirts. They raised the flag, sang the national anthem, said a Thai prayer, and did their morning exercises. We then entered the school and some of the ladies sat in small groups and read story books in English to them. The kids were very attentive and our group had a good time.

After leaving the pre-school, which OAT supports, it was off to the other end of the spectrum. Next stop was a "seniors club".

As you can imagine, most of rural Thailand are family farms. When the farmers get old, and can no longer farm, the lucky ones will be able to go daily to a Senior Club, but unlike senior centers here in Denver, these are also places where they continue to be productive.

At the "Don Chum Village" the old men raised chicken, catfish, mushrooms, and other vegetables. They then sell the products and share in the profits. This co-op was overseen by "Aunty Phen" who with a gentle hand, assures that chores are not forgotten, and the seniors are looked after.

Needless to say there is a lot of time for just talking. All of us know that "old people" are experts at talking. Some of the group had a round table discussion with the seniors, which they said was interesting. I stayed outside as it was a nice day and I don't like nursing homes, retirement homes, or anyplace that involves the "end game of life".

After the senior club visit, we had a very good home hosted lunch consisting of Sticky rice, fried pork, stir fried cabbage with oyster sauce and of course our own papaya salad, made with our purchased ingredients and fresh papayas from the trees of our host.

After lunch we continued on to Chiang Rai, stopping at lake "Kwan Payao", the 3rd largest lake (1.49 miles square) in Thailand, for a "happy room" stop, arriving at the Golden Pine Resort in Chiang Rai about 3 pm. The resort was very secluded. Our rooms were comfortable little cottages. Ours had a back deck looking onto a rice paddy. The grounds and pool were located in a palm garden. Many thought it was the best hotel of the trip. After enjoying the pool we all met for dinner in the hotel and were entertained by some in our group performing Karaoke. It was a fun dinner.

The MARS Associates Website

About halfway down the main page of the MARS website, www.marsretirees.org, you'll see a small box labeled "Search Engines & Links". There are a number of interesting links that pop up when you click the box with your mouse. For example, you'll see LOCKHEED MARTIN, HUBBLE, and ROAD **CONDITIONS.** At the top of the list is **GOOGLE**, the most popular internet search engine. There's a wealth of information on the internet, and GOOGLE can be your gateway. With GOOGLE you can search NEWS, WEBSITES, and IMAGES. If you start your search with DEFINITION or SYNONYM, then GOOGLE will act as your dictionary or thesaurus. If you type MOVIE and your ZIP code, you'll get a list of all the theaters and movies in your area, including show times.

Sometimes one gets frustrated at the overwhelming quantity of items returned from a search. There are ways to narrow your search to make the return volume less daunting. If your search string contains several words, GOOGLE may return items that contain only one of the words. But if you enclose your search string in quotes, then GOOGLE will search for the precise occurrence of the words in that order. Another way to limit the return results is to exclude terms. Say you want to know the speed of a jaguar - the animal, not the car. Using the minus sign to indicate exclusion, you could type SPEED JAGUAR -CAR to limit the information returned. You can use GOOGLE as a calculator simply type 25*33-64, for example, or 38 DEGREES F TO C to convert Fahrenheit to Celsius.

There are more GOOGLE tools that can be used to improve you're searching. In GOOGLE, type **SEARCH TIPS AND TRICKS**, and you'll find numerous lists providing tips to aid you're searching.

Commemorating the 100th Anniversary of the Glenn L. Martin Company



A Centennial Message from Lockheed Martin Chairman and CEO Bob Stevens and Vice Chairman, President and COO Chris Kubasik.

A century ago today, a California Superior Court clerk named W.B. Williams signed his name – with a flourish – to the incorporation documents of the Glenn L. Martin Company. When he retired in 1953, Martin had built an impressive legacy and a strong foundation for the future. His company would go on to power the space race, revolutionize manufacturing with the Zero Defects program, and blaze trails in rocket and missile technology. Some 83 years after its founding, Martin's company would cross paths with one founded by two barnstorming brothers named Lockheed, who also got their start in 1912. We'll celebrate the 100th anniversary of the founding of Lockheed on December 19.
