Kaiser Permanente was retained in California and Colorado as a temporary measure due to the complexity of accommodating the large number of Kaiser Permanente enrollees into the LM Healthworks Plan. Over age 65 (Medicare eligible) enrollees were not affected and were able to retain their medical insurance plans in 2010.

For those retirees that are enrolled with Kaiser Permanente medical health insurance this year and are concerned about continued enrollment for the 2011 calendar year, MARS Associates can offer this undate.

Recently Ralph Dergance and I met with Rich Kludt, Vice President of Human Resources of Lockheed Martin Space Systems Company who informed us that no decision has been made with regard to whether or not Kaiser Permanente will be offered as a medical health insurance plan in 2011. Rich went on to say that employee and retiree focus groups are planned for early May in Denver, CO, Sunnyvale, CA, and Palmdale, CA to gather information that will assist in determining the future relationship with Kaiser Permanente.

MEMBERSHIP DATA

MARS Membership Unit

MARS membership is defined in the policy manual as a family unit consisting of the retiree and spouse (or significant other), although the membership card and mailing data are in the retiree's name. In the event that the retiree dies, the spouse becomes the member in his/her own name and may remain a MARS member by continuing to pay the annual dues. The senior status accorded a membership is based on the retiree's date of birth, even for a surviving spouse member.

When renewing your membership, please verify all of your personal information including spouse or significant other on your form. The treasurer collects the mail and removes the checks before I receive your forms, so I don't see that information to verify or update the MARS records! If you have given permission for your email address to be posted on the website, please take a moment to verify that it has been posted correctly. Let me know of any changes.

Have you missed any of the STAR mailings, with newsletters, flyers and information about MARS and Lockheed Martin activities? Every quarter, there are a number of packages that do not arrive because members' addresses have changed without our being aware and bulk mail is not forwarded. Historian's Corner

MX-774 ATLAS DEVELOPMENT VEHICLE

Project MX-774 was the first step by the United States to develop an Inter Continental Ballistic Missile (ICBM). In 1945, the US Air Force invited industry to submit proposals for R&D of four missile types, the largest capable of hurling a warhead 5,000 miles and impacting within 1,500 feet of its intended target. By early January 1946, engineers at Convair's Vultee Field Division in Downey had two types of 5,000-mile missiles on their drawing boards. One was subsonic, winged and jet powered; the other was supersonic, ballistic and rocket powered. In April, Convair was awarded a \$1.4M contract for a one-year feasibility study of the two designs. In June 1946, detailed design work began under a \$2.0M USAF contract to develop the rocket powered version, designated the MX-774, a derivative of the V-2 rocket that incorporated significant improvements. At the beginning, very little information about the V-2 was available; Life Magazine pictures were scaled to obtain initial design and configuration data. Outwardly, the MX-774 was a single stage; liquid oxygen and alcohol propellant missile that looked a lot like a V-2.

Convair's project leader was an emigrated Belgian mining engineer, Karel J. "Charlie" Bossart. He was an inspirational and innovative force that remained with the MX-774 development through the maturing of the Atlas ICBM and subsequently the Atlas Space Launch Vehicle. Charlie Bossart became known as the "Father of the Atlas." The most significant MX-774 innovations were:

Four 2,000 pound thrust swiveling rocket engines (2 in pitch and 2 in yaw) replaced the carbon turning vanes in the V-2's exhaust to provide thrust vector control. Carbon turning vanes on the V-2 eroded during flight, compromising steering accuracy. This was the first known use of swiveling engines, which evolved into gimbaled engines on the Atlas;

A separable nose cone was used to improve reentry accuracy versus V-2's approach of keeping the payload attached to the spent rocket stage. Discarding the rocket stage before re-entry eliminated a very high heating and aerodynamic

loading environment, allowing the rocket structure to be significantly lighter;

A vehicle structure that used integral propellant tanks instead of the V-2's separate propellant tanks enclosed within a structural/aerodynamic outer shell. The tanks in the MX-774 were 0.081-inch thick aluminum, and improved the V-2's propellant-to-airframe weight by a factor of three. Charlie Bossart did propose using pressure stabilized stainless steel tanks like those later incorporated into the Atlas design, but the development and tooling cost for the MX-774 was prohibitive;

Also needed was a new electronic guidance system to steer the MX-774. The V-2's guidance was very elementary, provided by gyros, and was highly inaccurate. Jim Crooks, a recent electrical engineering graduate from Kansas State, led the development of a new guidance system consisting of a combination of ground stations and on-board avionics. His team designed what became the Azusa missile tracking system along with ultra-sensitive autopilots, transponders, and other electronics packages that comprised the MX-774's on-board guidance system.

Although the MX-774, a single stage 5,000 lb vehicle, was the first to demonstrate these innovations, the Atlas ICBM subsequently incorporated a stage-and-a-half design to meet performance requirements. This unique approach dropped off two booster engines and their support structure, but retained all propellant tankage. This permitted all Atlas engines to be ground started and confirmed to be running correctly before the vehicle was released. This eliminated a presumed reliability problem with starting rocked engines in flight, but complicated booster section staging.

The USAF initially funded the construction of 13 test vehicles, but funding reductions cut the number actually built to three. Each MX-774 vehicle was static test fired at San Diego's Point Loma using a test stand made from a modified oil well tower. The flame deflector was a flat concrete pan flooded with city water from a 4-inch line.

The three test flights at White Sands in July, September and December 1948 were not fully successful, with premature engine shutdown marring all three tests. But each vehicle performed better than its predecessor. Problems in addition to premature engine shutdowns included parachute deployment failures, propellant tank pressurization control problems, and engine LO2 inlet valve issues

(which apparently caused the early engine shutdowns). Also encouraging was the fact that in reaching supersonic speeds, the MX-774s had passed through the most critical vibration, control, pressure and aerodynamic environments. The test flights did validate the improvements made, and were instrumental in the subsequent USAF contract awarded to Convair in late 1950 for development of the Atlas ICBM.

Question from the Crowd

"Now that New Horizons is strictly in PDF format, how about distributing (to those who opt in) the MARS Star via email (in PDF format) and save some postage?"

This is a suggestion that has been discussed several times. The primary reason for not doing this in the past has been the need for current and accurate email addresses. You would be amazed as to how many are out-of-date, contain errors, etc. even though the members are asked to keep the organization appraised of any changes. Just this year, about 45% of the email addresses for the nearly 1700 members have changed and a full 20%-plus of the membership professes not to have email. Some change their e-mail addresses as often as their sox.

Our membership is made up of a great variety of age groups, personalities and memory levels. There are many seniors who do not have computers and would not be computer literate enough to even open a PDF file. Still another issue is the ability to keep track of who is and who is not getting a hardcopy, and then manage the label lists.

For standard mail, there are incentive postage rates based on the number of pieces in the mailing.

The organization needs to maintain a certain number, or the mail does not qualify for a reduced rate, so all remaining newsletters would have to be sent first class—LMSSC, who pays for the mailing, may object to that.

Maybe in a few more years when more of the computer-phobic people are gone, and the bulk of the membership is technology-adept, MARS can move to a softcopy and/or web-based system, but I don't believe we are there yet.

Planner's Report

Last summer, in July, Merriam Trube, with his significant other took a trip to Alaska. Here is his recounting of the trip.

Prince William Sound on the Sprit of Columbia

We were on a small ship with only fifty passengers. A seven foot draft is perfect for getting up close in the shallow water to see the glaciers. Prince

Williams Sound is not wide-open water like Puget Sound.

Prince William is a labyrinth of flooded valleys that have been carved by glaciers. Some of Channels were only 100 yards wide. They do get fog so navigation of the first order is required. The captain said, Yes, along with all the electronics he depends on tracking position with pencil on the chart, going slowly, watching the depth sounder and having a lookout on the bow.

We saw glaciers a mile across, 300 feet high and 300 feet below the water. They calved every 30 seconds, usually small, sometimes huge.

We saw Orcas, Humpbacks Whales, Sea Otters, Sea Lions (with males weighing 2000 pounds), Seals, Kittiwakes (nesting on the cliff by the thousands), Puffins, Murrelettes, Bald Eagles, Gulls, Ducks, and had dinner with the Captain - he also a fine specimen of 6'4" tall, 65 year old Swedish sea master with tales to tell.

Columbia glacier was 7 miles up from our closest approach. Grounded icebergs at the moraine where the water was only 30 feet deep stopped us. No way to pass, so we eased up to the blue ice to within kissing distance.

Oyster Dave came aboard for a talk about raising oysters way out there, alone except for his cat. Not doing it for money, but for the independence!

Three nights, about twenty glaciers all, the wildlife and that's enough - back to Anchorage.

<u>Denali</u>

Rode the train about 200 miles to Denali National Park. It went on to Fairbanks. This was a luxury - a dome car above the dining area. Lots of room and we could really se. On the way up we could see Mt McKinley with hardly any clouds. Glacier rivers, big and fast were flowing right by the tracks. They are full of gray powdered silt from the grinding ice. Later we crossed clear streams and could see a few bright red salmon.

Nice room, but up early for the 6:20 AM bus ride (all 90 miles) to the end of the road. Good views of Denali (Mount McKinley) and spectacular scenery, 21 Dall sheep up on a high grassy ridge, near the cliffs; that is their protections form the wolves.

Then a grizzly bear sow with cub, then another.

Saw thirteen bear by the end of the trip. Moose, golden eagles, and caribou we saw. Did not sight wolves. There are no elk or deer in the park. Winter is too much for them up there.

Two nights in the lodge, then train back to Anchorage, one last shopping spree and bed. 4:30 AM up far shuttle to the airport and on home at 10:00 PM, pooped!

There was a river channel just behind the lodge and on our walk - rather stroll - we found a small bear track in the mud on the bank. Not fresh but decidedly close. Anyone for a stroll in the Dark?? In the park, of course!

Sam Manuel passed away Thursday 4 February 2010 while in the Wuesthoff Progressive Care Center in Viera. Employees to Facilities in Centennial
