

# Special recognition planned for 25-year veterans at concert

Special recognition is being planned for employees who have been with Martin Marietta in Denver for 25 years during the 25th anniversary celebration Saturday, September 26.

Those to be honored are employees who were hired here in 1956 or who trasnferred to Denver from other company locations that year. These veteran employees and their guests will have special seating at the concert.

The doors at McNichols Arena will open at 6:00 pm. A buffet will be served from 6:00 pm from the arena's concession and auxiliary stands.

The program, featuring Neil Sedaka, will begin at 7:45 pm.

Because of the limited parking space in the arena area, special parking passes will be issued. With only 5500 spaces available, it will be necessary for employees and their guests to form carpools. One ticket will be distributed for each four persons — two employees and two guests.

Only those with the parking tickets will be permitted in the lots. Department administrators will be distributing tickets on a computer-selected basis within departments. Employees who receive a parking ticket should ask another employee to share the ride. Those who do not receive tickets should seek out a ticket holder. No vehicle will be allowed in the lots without a ticket.

A packet of information along with tickets for admission to the 25th anniversary celebration will be mailed to all employees in mid-September.

Classroom locations will be announced later.


#### **Address Correct?**

### The cover story

### Physicist turns blacksmith

In the cover photograph, Ray Rantanen is using a bellows made in 1861 to keep the coals in his blacksmith's forge hot.

When most people look for a change of pace from work, they turn to sports, or reading, or water colors, or similar conventional avocations.

Not Ray Rantanen, who is science adviser on the preservation of uncertainty for MX.

He has become a traditional blacksmith, using the oldest methods known to practice the craft. And he is teaching other Martin Marietta employees the skills and rewards of working with iron.

Recently at the Renaissance Festival at Larkspur, Rantanen and five other employees were producing art works as well as useful tools and equipment in full view of the Festival's visitors.

Rantanen began about five years ago to teach himself to be a blacksmith. At first, he worked in his backyard in Littleton, "pounding on iron for two years," as he puts it to learn. He outgrew the backyard, moved to the rural area near Castle

Rock, and has four blacksmith shops in a converted dairy barn.

It is in these four shops that he teaches others on evenings and weekends the joy of being a "renaissance man."

Rantanen has a PhD in physics and his most recent students, and the ones who helped at the Festival, are all scientifically trained.

Those who helped at the weekend Festival included Richard Finney, an electrical engineer; Thomas Gadbois, a power engineer; Robert Boyd, a mechanical engineer; Steve Chinn, a chemist; and Hans VanArkel, a mathematician.

"Iron is real," Rantanen says, "and when you work it at the temperatures created in a forge, you have to concentrate. You don't have time to the about other things."

Some of the products he turns out are art, simply to be looked at and admired. Others are useful, like gates, fences, fireplace tools—and cooking utensils for other "renaissance men," the black powder enthusiasts.

### Improvements made in Performance Sharing Plan

Employees eligible to participate in the Performance Sharing Plan may in additions to basic tributions invest up to five percent more of base salary for a total investment of 11 percent in the plan beginning in September.

When an employee has invested six percent, supplemental contributions of from one to five percent may be added to the basic contribution. The supplemental contribution, also made by payroll deduction, will not be matched by the Corporation.

The additional funds will be invested in the same way as the individual's basic contribution and can be suspended or withdrawn at any time by the individual, subject to certain penalties.

Nonexempt employees may begin the supplemental contribution with the September 10 paycheck and exempt employees may begin with the September 11 paycheck.

Enrollment forms for the supplemental contribution are available from the employee benefits office, Eng. 124. Telephone extensions are 4928 or 5609. The mail number is 1320.

Another amendment to the Performance Sharing Plan permits a "rollover" contribution. A new employee who receives a lump-sum distribution from a qualified pension plan or a profit-sharing plan from his former employer—or from his own individual retirement account—may invest this money in the Performance Sharing Plan. The investment may be made immediately upon em-

ment if certain conditions are met, or within Jays from the time he receives the distribution from his former plan. The amount that can be transferred to the Performance Sharing Plan is limited to the amount attributable to the employer's contribution, earnings on those contributions, and any earnings on the employee's contribution.

Beginning September 1, a participant in the Performance Sharing Plan may change investment options and transfer the accumulated value as past contributions twice in a calendar year. Before, changes were permitted only once each year.

It was also announced that interest rates on Fund B, the fixed income plan, had been increased June 1 from 11.25 percent to 11.75 percent annually.

Running—The Sheepherders running club began its 1981 fall series August 13. Seven races remain on the schedule.



### **Employee commended** for life-saving act

James A. Schaefer, strategic systems division, has received a cash award for coming to the aid of a stricken fellow employee. The award was made for "a significant life-saving act and in appreciation for his personal involvement and concern for a fellow employee."

Schaefer, arriving at the Greenwood Commons parking lot, observed an employee who appeared ill. The employee was perspiring, was having trouble breathing, and complained of chest pains and a numbness in one arm. Schaefer helped him into the building, made him comfortable, and sought help from security for a potential heart attack victim.

The security officer called for paramedical assistance and an ambulance and also went to the aid of the ill employee.

While enroute to the hospital, the employee suffered a "massive coronary," but because he was under professional medical attention, survived the attack.

The attending physician credited Schaefer with a life-saving act because of his recognition of the difficulty and his prompt action.

### Corporate gift aids hospital in Florida

Martin Marietta has made a \$7000 gift, for the purchase of a portable monitor/defibrillator, to the Jess Parrish Memorial Hospital in Titusville, FL.

The monitor will be used in the emergency room and when moving critically-ill patients. The equipment provides visual information and a printed copy of heart activity.

About 25 percent of the more than 600 employees working in the Cape Canaveral Air Force Station and at Kennedy Space Center live in the Titusville area.

The gift was presented to Richard A. Linn, executive director of the hospital, by Felix J. Scheffler, Canaveral operations director, and by Thomas C. Wirth, external tank operations director.


### Security chief is society president

### PT boat survivor, engineer builds PT 109 display

Donald Suarez Sr., an external tank operations quality engineer and the sole survivor of PT 20 mission, has developed a PT 109 display that is a permanent exhibit at the Naval Base in Jacksonville, FL. His replica of the boat on which the late President John F. Kennedy served in World War II was first displayed at NASA's Kennedy Space Center headquarters building.

The display depicts PT 109 making a torpedo run at full throttle.

"I built it as a tribute to all who served in PT squadrons and especially to those lost on combat patrol," Suarez said.

Suarez, a Martin Marietta employe for four and one-half years, was a U.S. Navy motor machinist mate first class from 1943 to 1950, serving in the Pacific with PT squadrons 6 and 21. He was on 93 combat patrols. He is a member of "PT Boat, Inc., WWII," whose members served on PT boats, PT tenders, and at PT bases.

He designs and builds custom plaques and models for the members. Some of his work is on display in the PT Boat Museum in Battleship Cove, Fall River, MA.
