

Accident plan rolls reopen in November

Those employees who missed the reenrollment in the Special Accident Insurance Plan in June may enroll in November for coverage to become effective December 1, 1985. Employees may also make changes in the amount of their insurance.

The Special Accident Plan is supplemental life insurance coverage that provides benefits in case of death, dismemberment, or total disability because of an accident on or off the job.

All active full-time employees are eligible to participate. Employees may select coverage from \$20,000 up to \$250,000, or up to \$500,000-not to exceed ten times their annual salary. Employees may insure the lives of their spouse and dependent children by selecting family coverage. Employee insurance costs 9 cents per week per \$10,000 of coverage. Coverage for the employee and dependents is 14 cents per week per \$10,000.

Denver area motorists urged to join Better Air Campaign

Martin Marietta employees have been asked to participate in the 1985 Better Air Campaign, which begins November 15, 1985 and will continue to January 15, 1986.


The Better Air Campaign is a voluntary, community-wide program designed to reduce high levels of carbon monoxide air pollution in the Denver metropolitan area during the peak pollution season. The campaign will involve drivers in the five major metropolitan counties: Denver, Arapahoe, Adams, Boulder, Douglas, and Jefferson. The program has been expanded this year to include public schools, businesses, and municipal governments as well as the general public.

The goal of the 1985 campaign is to achieve reduction of 2.4 million miles

traveled throughout the metro area on high-pollution days. By the end of the 1984 campaign, a 5-percent reduction in traffic (an average savings of 1.4 million miles traveled) had been attained.

All Denver area motorists will be asked to avoid driving on high pollution days when announced in the media, particularly between 3 and 6 p.m. In addition, motorists will be asked to leave their cars at home one weekday, based on the last number of their license plate. Drivers who can't leave their cars at home on the assigned days are encouraged to select another weekday to participate in the program.


PSP forms due November 29

George M. Bunker dies; former company chairman

Credit union growth helps employees

As Denver Aerospace has expanded in recent years, the Red Rocks Federal Credit Union also has expanded to meet employees' financial needs.

At the close of 1984 the credit union held \$5.2 million in assets, and projections indicate assets will be about \$9 million the end of 1985.

"Our membership has grown to include 60 percent of the Denver Aerospace employees," said Bernie Delaney, credit union manager. "With this level of employee participation, we are an established and very sound fullservice financial institution for Martin Marietta, Data Systems, Defense Contract Audit Agency, Air Force plant representatives and their families."

Employees can earn higher dividends on share accounts (savings) than at banks or savings and loans, and belowmarket rates on loans, Delaney said.

Shares earn 6-1/2 percent per annum,

George M. Bunker, 77, founder and former Chairman of the Board of Martin Marietta Corporation and a major figure in development of the aerospace industry, died Tuesday, November 5, at his home in Washington, D.C.

Bunker was elected president of Martin Company in 1952 and guided the company from its production of seaplanes and bombers to its leadership position in defense, space and systems management, and subsequent merger with American-Marietta Company. Bunker retired from the presidency of Martin Marietta in 1972 and continued as its chairman until 1977.

In addition to his leadership of Martin Marietta, he played a primary role in formation of the Bunker Ramo Corporation and served as its first chairman. The International Eye Foundation awarded its 1975 Medal of Honor to Bunker for his contributions to programs for the prevention and cure of blindness in developing nations, and he sponsored fellowships to enable American eye surgeons to work among the poor and to bring foreign doctors to the U.S. for training.

Data Systems joins forces in Japan

Martin Marietta Data Systems has formed a three-company consortium to establish a Tokyo-based computer software company. Intelligent Systems Co, Ltd will market and provide support for Martin Marietta's RAMIS II fourth-generation software language in Japan.

Intelligent Systems Co, to be known as I-SYS in Japan, was incorporated on October 28, 1985. Key Japan-based staff have already received indepth training by Martin Marietta. The other companies in the consortium are Mitsui & Co, Ltd, one of the largest trading companies in Japan with \$70 billion in annual revenues, and Florida Progress Corp, the parent company of Florida Power.

"The Japanese computer software market is the second largest in the world, second only to the U.S.," said Patrick J. Zilvitis, president of Data Systems. "Intelligent Systems Co, Ltd, has been well capitalized for strong long-term participation with Japan's computer industry and has the full support of Mitsui management."

Corporation elects three new directors

Martin Marietta Corporation announced November 5, 1985, the election of three






Michael A. Jacobs displays an eightinch model of the Venus Radar Mapper he built.
